2. Apply for Indonesia summer study abroad by March 1

Interested in gaining firsthand field and living experience next summer in Indonesia, the largest Muslim-majority democracy in the world? CSEAS associate Kikue Hamayotsu (Political Science) is leading [Democracy and Cultural Diversity in Indonesia May 21–June 4](#) in Yogyakarta, Central Java. The two-week program will focus on how Indonesia's diversity informs the country's politics, religious and ethnic diversity and conflict, and a rapidly changing Southeast Asian society. Yogyakarta is a vibrant hub of culture, arts, education and industry. Participants will live at [Gadjah Mada University](#) and participate in daily activities and field trips. Students can earn up to six hours of graduate or undergraduate credit

(undergraduate credit can be applied to CSEAS's minor in Southeast Asian studies). The cost is \$3,250 (not including airfare). **Deadline to apply: March 1.** NIU offers limited funding opportunities, including the Provost Travel Grant (contact the NIU Study Abroad office) and other options, such as the Student Engagement Fund, listed in Money for Study below. NIU Study Abroad also offers the opportunity to study Laotian history, language and culture through the five-week [SAIL](#) program offered by the San Francisco-based Center for Lao Studies in San Francisco. The program will be held **June 27–July 31** in Vientiane, Laos, based at the Lao-American College, the first private college and only school founded by a US citizen in the Laos. Participants can earn up to 10 hours of undergraduate credit. Cost is \$2,960 (\$3,785 with college credit). **Deadline to apply: April 3.** Some scholarship funding available from SAIL (funding application deadline is **March 15**) in addition to some NIU funding.

CSEAS and NIU's International Training Office (ITO) are actively seeking area home stay hosts for two spring Southeast Asia youth exchange programs sponsored by the U.S. State Department at NIU for more than a decade.

CSEAS is looking for 30 households to host 45 high school students and nine adult leaders from nine Southeast Asian countries participating in the Southeast Asia Youth Leadership Program ([SEAYLP](#)). Home-stay dates are **April 8–16**. Students may be placed in pairs and adults as singles. Hosts provide a bed for each participant, breakfast each day and most dinners, all meals during any weekend days at home, and transportation to and from class sessions at NIU. Host-stay family orientation is scheduled for 6:30 to 8 p.m. Monday, **April 3**, on campus. CSEAS is accepting graduate student applications to be the Teaching Assistant for SEAS 225, the center's undergraduate Southeast Asia survey course, for the 2017–18 academic year. The assistantship is a full-time (20 hours per week) position; the class is taught on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 12:30 to 1:45 p.m. Most lectures will be given by NIU's Southeast Asia faculty in a variety of disciplines. Specific duties include: Develop course syllabus and assessment modules; grade all exams, papers and assignments; keep office hours for student tutoring and guidance on lecture materials; post course material on Blackboard; teach some classes, including overview

lectures and presentations relevant to his/her discipline and research interests. Applicants should be advanced in their graduate studies (minimum two years) and must have knowledge of or experience in Southeast Asia, in addition to strong organizational, written and communication skills. Previous TA experience preferable but not essential. Preference will be given to those in the process of completing the graduate certificate in Southeast Asian studies. Position pays monthly stipend plus full tuition waiver. All materials, including a graduate assistantship application, cover letter, resume, and two reference contacts, must be received by Office Manager Lisa Heal by 9 a.m.

Since the [series' inception](#) in September 2016, Crossroads podcasts have been downloaded 658 times with listeners in 26 countries, Thailand having the most after the U.S.

- **US-INDO Summer Studies Program:** Intensive 10-week language and cultural studies program **May 25–Aug. 3** in Yogyakarta is sponsored by the US-Indonesia Society with support from the Freeman Foundation. The 2017 program includes a 10-day break to accommodate the Islamic holiday of Eid al-Fitr.
