### 2. New Boren award targets Bahasa NEW

The Institute of Higher Education (IIE) is introducing a new fully funded David L. Boren language-study scholarship aimed specifically at increasing the number of Indonesian-speakers in the U.S. The Indonesian Flagship Language Initiative program begins with an eight-week Indonesian language program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's <u>Southeast Asian Studies Summer Institute</u>, followed by a fall program in Indonesia at the State University of Malang administered by the American Councils for International Education. Awardees are encouraged to request funding to stay in Indonesia after the fall language program is complete and participate in study abroad programs they identify on their own, according to IIE. Both undergraduates and graduate students are encouraged to <u>apply</u> (Feb. 8 deadline for undergrads, Jan. 30 deadline for graduate students).

This will be Jacobs' third trip to Indonesia, having traveled there as a summer FLAS fellow in 2016 and a Critical Language Scholar in 2017. . . . Cao will be on campus for a year conducting his dissertation research on China-Burma relations after the Cold War.
