Koelle's remarks (p. 19) –

"Bute is west of Kepare, east of Mber, south Mfum, and within three weeks' journey from the Phula country Adama."

"Bute.\*-- From Gol, or Thomas Klein, born in the town of Kue, where he was taken in war by the Phula, who are there called Tebese, in about his nineteenth year. They soon sold him to the Hausas, who brought him to Yoruba and sold him to the Portuguese. He has been in Sierra Leone three years, with only one boy and one girl of the Bute country."

12. Bûte,—From Göl, or Thomas Klein, born in the town of Kûe, where he was taken in war by the Phûla, who are there called Tebése, in about his nineteenth year. They soon sold him to the Hausas, who brought him to Yórūba and sold him to the Portuguese. He has been in Sierra Leone three years, with only one boy and one girl of the Bûte country.

Remarks.—Bûte is west of Képare, east of Mbér, south of Mfúm, and within three weeks' journey from the Phúla country Adáma.

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n," i. e. cannibals.—From Albarka, of Freetown. rn in the town of Gárāka, whence he was sent, in about his twelfth year, to Bousi, as part of the annual tribute in slaves. He lived in Bousi till about his twenty-eighth year, and as there are a great many Dsarawas in Bousi, and he occasionally returned to his native country, he always retained a perfect command of his mother-tongue. He has been in Sierra Leone three years, and is the only Nyamnyam.

Remarks.-Gárāka, the Dṣarāwa capital, is three days' journey from Bousi, where the Púlo "Yakuba resides, to whom Dsarawa is tributary. Dsarawa is west of Babárbare, i. e. Bórnu, and east of Tsóutsou.

3. Kóro.-From Gbála, or Sam John, of Allenstown, born in the village of 'Etera, on the small river Boga, where he was taken in war by the Lapias in about his nineteenth year, and sold to Abébere, i.e. Hausa, for a horse. He was one year on his journey to the sea, and has been four years in Sierra Leone, with three countrymen. He has a little impediment in his speech, so that I am doubtful whether a certain sound is the English "th," or "z," or "s."

Remarks.-Kôro is west of Potaki and Lapia, outh-east of Aduma, south of N'goadadsé, north of N'goa Kóturkō. Also four days' journey from Bása, two days from Máda, four days from Gbáli, and one week from Nupe; from 'Abebere, i. e. Hausa, o week, and, e.g., from Káno two weeks, and three weeks from Mandara

4. Hām, or Dṣahām, or Fuham, called "Dṣaba" by the Paras, i. e. Hausas.-From Dsetham, or George Harding, of Freetown, born in the town of Ridsal. where he was taken in war by the Paras seven years ago. He is now about thirty years of age, and has been in Sierra Leone three and a-half years, with three countrymen.

Remarks.-Ridsal is nearly one day's journey from a long range of mountains (dsódsöli, i.e. mountain; tsēt, i.e. hill). Hām is situated east of Kóro; also one day's journey from Fúkoi', two days from Gbali, four days from Para, i.e. Hausa, two days from Fai, and one day from Fúngō. The Hams call the Phula "Fáto," and are stiled by them "Kafīri."

5. Akurákura,-From 'Otu, or John Macauly, of Waterloo, born in 'Atām-Nómūnu, whence he was sold in about his fifteenth year to the Akurakura town "Agurágor," where he grew up, married, and had a child about eight years of age when he was sold to the Spaniards. He has been in Sierra Leone twenty years, with about six individuals, who, like himself, were brought to Akurakura as slaves, and thus learnt the language.

Remarks. - Aguragor is situated on the river Oiono, i.e. Kálaba. Akurákura is west of Abīri, where a different language is spoken; east of 'Afra, where they speak 'Ibo.

6. Okam.-From Otsetse, or John Davis, of Freetown, born in Ofesem, where he lived till about his twentysecond year, when he was kidnapped, and at the end of one year sold to the Portuguese. He has been in Sierra Leone thirty years, with a few countrymen remaining.

Remarks.-'Okām is situated west of 'Atām, as the 'Okams call Ekamtulufu and some other neighbouring countries; east of Alike and Odsenye; also near Idsárawur, Usobo, Iterága, Ola, and Ogbodon.

7. Yásgua.-From Otén, or Sam Pratt, of Freetown. born in the town of Ndúro, where he lived till about his twenty-second year, when he was sold by the chief, and brought to the sea by way of Ashante. He has now been ten years from his home, and four in Sierra Leone, where four more individuals understand this language.

Remarks.-Ndúro is seven days' journey from Rába. Yasgua is east of Goali, south-west of 'Oza, i.e. Hausa; also near Kambali and Nupe.

8. N'ki.-From Obi, or William Renner, of Freetown, born in the town of Buangbé, two miles from Kako, the capital, where he was seized in his nineteenth year for a debt of his father's, and sold. After a two years' stay in Kálabā, he was brought to Sierra Leone, where he was at once enlisted as a soldier, which he has been now nearly twenty years. He has one countryman in Sierra Leone, and two on the Island of Ascension.

Remarks.-N'ki is east of Ekamtulufu, west of Bodse, where the same language is spoken, also west of Bőbi, which has a different language; north of Mámbā; south of Bénêre, where also N'ki is spoken.

9. Kámbāli.-From Kēáuta, in Waterloo, born in the town of Magóuāta. He was kidnapped by the Phula when about twenty-six years of age, and is now about sixty.

—Also from Laise, of Charlotte, born in Magóuata, was about thirty years of age when kidnapped, and is now about sixty-five. There are at present about fifteen Kambalis in Sierra Leone.

Remarks.-Magóuāta is two days' journey from Rába on the Koara, Kambali is west of Gbanki, east of Tágba; also near Goáli, Kurárāfa, Bárāba, and Basa.

10. Alége.-From 'Obe, or Sally Thomas, of Wellington, born in the village of Mogbe, nearly a day's journey from Alége, the Alége capital, where she was sold by relatives in about her fifteenth year. After a stay at Obane of one and a-half years, she was brought to Sierra Leone, where she has now been thirteen years, with only one countryman, who has forgotten part of his language, but was present and assisted her when she gave me the specimens

Remarks.-Alége is four days' journey from Obane; west of Marga, with a different language; east of Alárkue, also with a different language

11. Pénin.-From Déwo, or John Smith, of Regent, born in the town of Ndukore, where he also married and lived for two years. He has been in Sierra Leone about thirty years, with six countrymen.

Remarks.-Pénin is east of Pándem, west of Döbátūrom; also near Bása, Mbár, and Pásor. In Pénin most of the men are naked, but the women cover themselves with leaves before and behind.

12. Búte.-From Gol, or Thomas Klein, born in the town of Kue, where he was taken in war by the Phula, who are there called Tebése, in about his nineteenth year. They soon sold him to the Hausas, who brought him to Yórūba and sold him to the Portuguese. He has been in Sierra Leone three years, with only one boy and one girl of the Búte country.

Remarks.-Búte is west of Képare, east of Mbér, south of Mfum, and within three weeks' journey from the Phula country Adama.

13. Múrundo or Bárundo.-From Bíra, or George Bailey, of Freetown, born in the town of Okuma, one day's journey from the sea, where he lived till his nineteenth year, when he was kidnapped and sold. He has been four years on the Island of Ascension, and eighteen years in Sierra Leone, with about a dozen of his countrypeople, his wife being one of them.

Remarks.-Bárundo borders on the sea, and is situate vest of Mbúrūke, east of Ire, i.e. Kálabā, and of Usa·le.

14. Undáza.-From Yápānda, or Martha Pratt, of Lomley, born in the town of Peme, in the Ubiene District, whence she was removed when a child to the very lengthened town of Nsógadíwapeí, where she was taken in war, when her first child was just able to walk. She was about one year on her journey to, and now about ten in, Sierra Leone, where she is the only individual of Undáza

Remarks.--Undáza is west of Undúmba. It is also four days' journey from Batéke, where cannibals reside, one day from Bandsinana, one day from Ungómu, and Bākúta is reached by walking ten days' journey in the direction towards the sea.

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
