State University of New York-Albany political scientist Meredith Weiss, director of the Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy, will present "Roots of Resilience: Party Machines and Grassroots Politics in Southeast Asia" at noon Friday, **Sept. 13**, in Campus Life 110 (in the Honors Program office). 2. Center associates update: Grantsmanship and conferences near and far NEW

★ Hao Phan (University Libraries) received good news over the summer that the Henry Luce Foundation has awarded a \$1.2 million grant to the Association of Asian Studies' Committee on Research Materials on Southeast Asia (CORMOSEA), \$610,000 of which is coming to NIU's Southeast Asia Digital Library. The four-year grant will go toward hiring a full-time web developer and digitize new content for the 14-year-old digital archive, established in 2005 and funded by the U.S. Department of Education from 2005 to 2011. Phan, a published poet, is also in print with Radio Mua He [Summer Radio], a collection of poetry in

CSEAS Assistant Director Jui-Ching Wang (School of Music) is also attending MCAA to present "I Sing, Therefore I am: Javanese Children's Singing Games and Their Historical, Local, and Global Contexts."

* Tharaphi Than (World Languages and Cultures) is on sabbatical this fall, researching feminism and feminist movements in Myanmar. Than, who has been in SEA since this summer, was a speaker in the seminar, "'New' and Competing Nationalisms in Myanmar," on **June 28** at the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies Yusof Ishak Institute in Singapore.

* Kikue Hamayotsu (Political Science) is presenting "Making the Majority in the Name of Islam: Democratization, Moderate-Radical Coalition and Religious Intolerance in Indonesia" at the **Sept. 10–14** European Southeast Asian Studies (EuroSEAS) conference in Berlin. Earlier in the month, Hamayotsu participated in a mini-conference sponsored by the American Political Science Association (APSA) Southeast Asian Politics Group, "Citizenship in the Peripheries: Identities in Southeast Asia," serving as discussant for the Indonesia/Malaysia/Singapore session at the APSA's annual meeting in Washington, DC.

CSEAS welcomes new Anthropology instructor Matthew Trew (PhD candidate, anthropology, University of Wisconsin-Madison) to campus. He is teaching ANTH 422, Gender in Southeast Asia; SEAS 490, Tourism and Cultural Heritage in Southeast Asia; SEAS 225, Southeast Asia: Crossroads of the World; and Introduction to Cultural Anthropology. Trew, a cultural anthropologist who works primarily in Battambang, Cambodia, is interested in tourism studies, urban development and narratology. His research focuses on thematic tourism as a strategy for establishing competitive symbolic economies in smaller urban areas of the developing world. He also studies themed spaces, theme park design and strategy, and the Disneyization process. Other interests include cultural heritage management, postcolonial space, dark tourism (the tourism of death and tragedy), religious

tourism, performance and circus, and visual anthropology/ethnographic film. In addition to his research, Trew has also worked closely with Cambodia's Phare Ponleu Selpak Fine Arts School and Circus, most recently collaborating with their performance school to write a circus show based on his historical research. He also consults with the government of Battambang regarding tourism management and the city's ongoing application for UNESCO World Heritage Status, and also runs the website BambooTrain.com to help promote and preserve Battambang's endangered bamboo train attraction.
