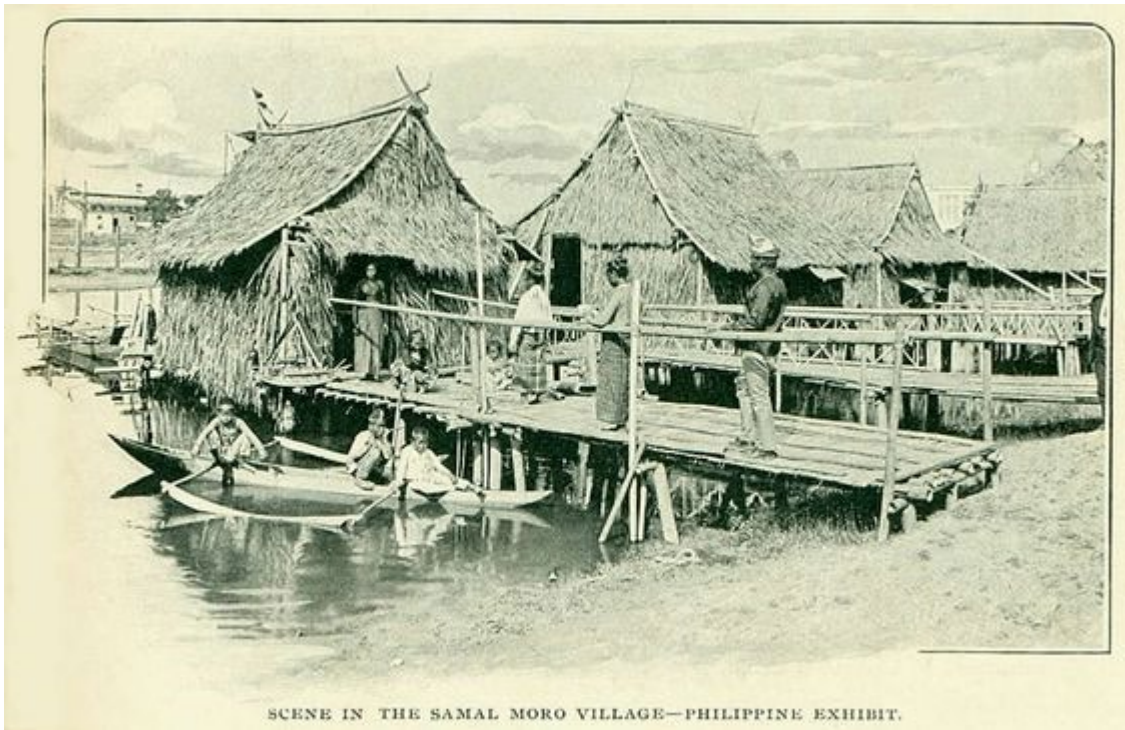

1. This week's Friday lecture: Virtual and in person **NEW**

With easing of campus COVID-19 guidelines, the [March 19](#) Friday lecture will be presented both in person and online (via Microsoft Teams). Historian and NIU alumnus [Michael Hawkins](#), chair of the History Department at Creighton University, will present "Sensational Savages: Marketing the Moro Village at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, 1904" both virtually and in person at noon in Campus Life 100. Attendance is limited to 40 and masks and social distancing will apply. No food or drink may be brought into the room. Hawkins, a former Fulbright fellow in the Philippines, focuses his research on empire, Islam and agency in Asia with a particular interest in notions of historical time. He will also

be keynote speaker for the 2021 Spring Southeast Asian Studies Student Conference (see below).

2. Five panels assembled for virtual Southeast Asian Studies Student Conference **NEW**

Eighteen students, including two from the Philippines and Thailand, will present [March 20](#) in this year's Southeast Asian Studies Student Conference, a virtual event from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. CDT via [Zoom](#). Five panels have been assembled, with the first running from 8:15 to 9:30 a.m. (see sidebar). Keynote speaker Michael Hawkins, author of *Making Moros: Imperial Historicism and American Military Rule in the Philippine Muslim South* (Northern Illinois University Press, 2012) and *Semi-Civilized: The Moro Village at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition* (just released from Cornell University Press), will speak from 1 to 2 p.m. His topic is "People of the Past: Reflections on Locating, Examining, and Representing Historical Subjects in Southeast Asia." The conference is free and open to the public. Please register with Zoom by **March 19** (and to receive confirming email and schedule).

CSEAS presents its last spring Friday lecture at noon [April 16](#) as a virtual event with [Shorna Allred](#), associate professor in Cornell University's Department of Natural Resources and the Environment, who will present "Cultural Resilience in Borneo." Allred's research blends human factors and natural sciences with the goal of improving resource management and conservation. Her [lecture](#), cohosted by the NIU Department of Geographic and Atmospheric Sciences, will focus on her research into the cultural resilience of the Penan hunter-gather peoples who have lived in the Borneo rainforest for generations but whose culture and way of life are now experiencing environmental and development pressures. 5. Recent Indonesian air disaster’s subject of latest SEA Crossroads podcast



In the most recent [episode](#), host Eric Jones interviews Chicago lawyers Thomas Gardiner and Brittany Hebler (a former FLAS fellow who studied Bahasa Indonesian while a student at NIU) about their firm’s litigation representing victims of recent Indonesian airline disasters. Also, [Napalm in the Morning](#), an exploration of films dealing with the Vietnam War, has joined the Center’s wide-ranging podcast series, [Southeast Asia Crossroads](#). Southeast Asia Crossroads’ following has

grown to nearly 49,000 listens since its 2016 debut with listeners in 95 countries; topics range from history and politics to art and culture. Since its June 2020 debut, [Napalm in the Morning](#), also hosted by Jones and Jagel, has examined six Vietnam films (*Full Metal Jacket*, *Rambo First Blood*, *Platoon*, *Coming Home*, *Good Morning Vietnam*, *Nixon*, and *We Were Soldiers*).

6. Two new books in NIU/Cornell Southeast Asia Series

Cornell University Press, where NIU Press has been an imprint since 2019, has released two new books in the NIU Southeast Asia Series. [The Saigon Sisters: Privileged Women in the Resistance](#), by Patricia D. Norland, was released in July. The book traces the lives of nine Vietnamese women who grew up in a French lycée and later fought for independence beginning with the French occupation of Vietnam through the Second Vietnamese War’s end in 1975. [Semi-Civilized: The Moro Village at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition](#), by Creighton University historian and CSEAS alumnus Michael C. Hawkins (PhD history, 2009), was released in March. Hawkins’ book examines Moro (Filipino Muslim) contributions to the 1904 St. Louis World’s Fair, challenging the manifestations of “empire” at the event and in American discourse at the time
